In addition, the GEVCD is housed in the Johnson Control Business Park, at low rent cost, to enable the GEVCD to maintain a public presence and office space.
Small Business Development Center	The College's Small Business Development Center supports the development of small businesses in the region through its services that include development of business plans, marketing plans and seeking of financing sources. In addition, the SBDC provides specialized training courses relevant to the needs of small business owners.
