<b>Catalog Course Description</b>	Students will explore mythology from a psychological point of view, paying particular attention to the relationship between mythology and psychoanalytic traditions. In addition, students will learn mythological patterns and interpret their meaning within a psychoanalytic context, while also exploring both myth and psychology as different ways of knowing. Prerequisite: ENG 1120. (Fall, Spring, Summer) (3, 3T+0S).
